

DESCRIPTION	Francois Bernier was a French doctor, historian, political scientist and traveller. He came to India in 1656 and remained here for twelve years upto 1668. During this period he worked as the personal physician to Mughal prince Dara Shikoh, the elder son of the Mughal emperor Shah Jehan. After Dara Shikoh's death he was attached to the court of the Mughal emperor Aurangzeb. He wrote Travels in the Mughal Empire, which describes mainly about the reign of Aurangzeb. It is based on his own extensive journeys, observations and first hand information gathered from Mughal courtiers.
	In this book, Bernier has described about the wealth and grandeur of the Mughal Empire. The memorandum of Bernier provided statistical data of the revenues received by the Mughals. He estimated that the combined revenue from the Mughal subas, parganas and sarkars was twenty two Crores. Bernier described Mughal king's appearance in this way, "King appeared seated upon his throne, at the end of the great hall, in the most magnificent attire, his vest was of white and delicately followed satin, with silk and gold embroidery of the finest texture." According to him the Mughal throne was supported by six massy feet of solid gold, sprinkled over with rubies, emeralds and diamonds and the throne valued at four crore rupees. According to Bernier no one met the emperor empty-handed. When he himself met Aurangzeb, he presented him with eight rupees as a mark of respect and offered a knife-case, a fork and a pen-knife mounted in amber to Fazel-khan, a minister on whose decision depended the amount of his salary as physician."

	Bernier suggested that offering presents to the emperor was mandatory. Omrahs or Indian nobles presented magnificent gifts to the king during the festivals and on anniversaries. They were expected to make a valuable present to the king, according to the amount of their pay. Some of Omrahs used this occasion to bribe the king for personal favours. They used the opportunity sometimes for the sake of an ostentatious display, sometimes to divert the king from instituting an inquiry into the exactions committed in their official situations and sometimes to gain the favour of the king and by that means obtain an increase of salary. Bernier described the manner in which the ambassadors entered the court of Aurangzeb. He witnessed that the ambassadors at a distance made a Salam or Indian act of obeisance placing the hand thrice upon the head and as often dropping it down to the ground. They then approached near to the emperor Aurengzeb to hand over the letters to him. The letters were presented to the king, who after having perused the contents commanded that the ambassadors should be given a Serapah or vesture from head to foot, namely, a vest of brocade, a turban, and a sash or girdle.








